
WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE PART ABOUT THE WORK THAT YOU DO?
"I love seeing an individual with a disability shine, have a choice, and a voice."


WHAT NEEDS TO CHANGE IN THE WORLD TO SUPPORT WOMEN LEADERS?



WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE PART ABOUT THE WORK THAT YOU DO? "It is getting to the point where you can see results. To see the transformation of the community or that you contributed to the living conditions for the mothers, or see the children smile. You contributed to that transformation."

"So much needs to change. End gender-based violence. We need economic justice for work done. Sexual and reproductive health and rights prioritized. Access to education. Equal opportunities for girls. Leadership opportunities for girls and young women. There is a lot of work to be done."

WHAT IS ONE PIECE OF ADVICE YOU HAVE FOR YOUNG WOMEN/GIRLS? "Be who you are. Decide what your morals, principles, and ethics are and let them guide you. Be a role model for other young people."

WHO INSPIRES YOU?


"My mother. She was a great example of a woman fostering her own path at a time that it wasn't easy."


WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE PART ABOUT THE WORK THAT YOU DO? "In the ministry of love, our job is to put in the seeds of knowledge, of hope, of resiliency, of empowerment, all those little seeds, put them in their heart as much as we can. And then at the end, hopefully we will see them grow."

That's how being a leader is; you start first, then go from there... Don't let fear or others get in the way of your mission in life or what it is you want to do."

WHO INSPIRES YOU?


"I really love Brene Brown. She brings the best of both worlds. Having the ability to speak to people and having the brains and passion to use her knowledge and make it so accessible."

It won't be easy or straightforward, but if you know it's something you want to do, there's a way to meet people and go places. You've got to hold on to the belief that you can make it happen, and you will."

WHO INSPIRES YOU?

"At my placement in college I had this mentor and the connection I made with her was so impactful. She created a positive learning environment that was very experiential and inclusive. It gave me a lot of learning opportunities."

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE PART ABOUT THE WORK THAT YOU DO? "It gives you the best of both worlds. That practical side where you can meet the young people and applicants, get to see what the outcomes are, and hear stories on the ground, while also having data management and that strategic element where the focus is on how we can grow the organization."

WHAT NEEDS TO CHANGE IN THE WORLD TO SUPPORT WOMEN LEADERS? "I'm about to go on maternity leave and I've never questioned for a minute if that's going to hamper my progression or career; but if I was in a different organization, maybe I would feel differently. Those are the conversations and considerations. Then you have the whole pay parity, and childcare. It disincentivizes women going back to work."

WHAT IS ONE PIECE OF ADVICE YOU HAVE FOR YOUNG WOMEN/GIRLS?
"It is important for women to put themselves out there, be confident in their abilities, and find those support systems both professionally and personally."

WHO INSPIRES YOU?

"It's the women who've made discoveries or created, designed, or developed cures or products who have been unsung and had little recognition at the time."

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE PART ABOUT THE WORK THAT YOU DO? "I think it is seeing young people develop self-agency, the ability to make good decisions or to make decisions and know why they've made them and see them develop self love."

WHAT NEEDS TO CHANGE IN THE WORLD TO SUPPORT WOMEN LEADERS?

"There are still so many systemic barriers that impact girls and women significantly and they're the critical pieces. Women have got to have ownership of their own bodies and the right to determine what happens to them. It is about equity, isn't it? Seeing women as equal."

WHAT IS ONE PIECE OF ADVICE YOU HAVE FOR YOUNG WOMEN/GIRLS? "Don't raise the drawbridge. If you get to a position of leadership or where you have influence, don't make it hard for the women behind you to get an opportunity."

WHO INSPIRES YOU?

"My mom is an inspiration because she left early on and moved to America as a first generation African woman and had to work her way up to different challenges. She was navigating the paths and open doors in the US without anyone to direct her."

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE PART ABOUT THE WORK THAT YOU DO? "At the end of the day, I feel good when I go to sleep and feel that I've been able to create impact and touch lives. I want to be someone to leave a legacy of impact as I'm developing and I'm building my own footprints on this journey called life."

WHAT NEEDS TO CHANGE IN THE WORLD TO SUPPORT WOMEN LEADERS? "We need to raise boys that understand the value and importance of having women in their lives, not just as partners or mothers, but as co-creaters. As women, we should always stop limiting ourselves, the possibilities are limitless, let's keep raising the bar and pushing forward opening doors that have been closed to our gender."

WHAT IS ONE PIECE OF ADVICE YOU HAVE FOR YOUNG WOMEN/GIRLS? "I believe in the power of mentorship and having positive female relationships. Don't take no for an answer until you can't do anything but take that. Keep knocking on those doors and keep pushing."
